REPORT FROM OUR BOARD CHAIR

Duly elected by State Council members, the Board continues to responsibly meet the objectives of Girl Guides Queensland (GGQ) in our 104-year journey to achieve our mission.

We are proud to have seen another enriching year of Guiding in Queensland following the strategic pillars (2022–2026) and delivered by members, volunteers and staff with assistance from supporters and funding bodies.

I welcome incoming Directors, and thank outgoing Directors, each of whom will or have contributed to the success as outlined in this year's annual report.

I thank Sarah Page, Finance and FAR Committee Chair, for her service and collaboration as her term comes to an end at the AGM, and Kathryn Pearson, State Commissioner, for stepping into the role of Interim and Co-Chair this year.

A huge thank you to the CEO, Kim Harrington, and Board Secretary, June Lee, for their guidance, technical support and executive administration provided to the volunteer roles of the Board and all Board committees.

In approving the strategic priorities and subsequent budget for 2023, we continue to drive long-term change by identifying and managing risk, enhancing member satisfaction and modernising systems and processes.

The Board allocated significant time to strategic priorities including State Council engagement in revising the Constitution (April/September), Girl Guiding in Australia (GGiA) forums and working groups, strategy sessions and a review of sustainability which influenced the budget commitments for 2024.

Delegated to the CEO, impressive progress implementing the GGA Child Safe Child Friendly Framework continued. We thank everyone

for their contribution to this fundamental requirement of safety, which enables offering a safe space to engage with Guiding. GGiA is a member of the National Redress Scheme. Led by our CEO and supported by our Archivist, Guiding family and external expertise, we responded efficiently and respectfully to requests for information.

The global impact of reducing volunteers and increasing responsibilities due to regulatory obligations has led to some volunteer functions transferring to paid functions. A new Volunteer Support Officer role and continued funding for an Events Officer (introduced in 2022) have demonstrated value to Members and minimised organisational risk.

Most importantly, we thank all our tireless volunteers, capably led by our State Commissioner and her leadership team, for putting their time and heart into providing an exceptional experience for our girls and women. Our volunteer network could not run without the dedication and skills of our State Office team and their 'above and beyond' efforts to keep us sustainable, visible and operational.

We have immense appreciation for the leadership and vision of our CEO, Kim Harrington, who throughout her tenure has not wavered in her drive, commitment, and agility leading GGQ.

Our Board could not operate without the invaluable mix of voluntary expertise and commitment, and I thank each Director for their contributions.

REPORT FROM OUR CHIEF EXECUTIVE OFFICER

I am delighted to present the 2023 Annual Report.

The consolidation plans for 2023 were not simply met, they went full steam ahead despite delays in national projects and shared services.

This is the result of exceptional teamwork with a shared vision, commitment, resources, talent and some good humour to help in those stressful times. To our Members, Leadership teams, volunteers and staff, and particularly, Kathryn Pearson, State Commissioner, I thank you.

Our focus was to embed the significant changes across the organisation since 2020 and I thank the Board for endorsing and funding the Strategic and Operational priorities. This is a prerequisite for enabling a reinvigorated and more relevant charity to support girls and women with leadership and community service opportunities for decades to come.

There has been impressive progress implementing the GGA 'Child Safe Child Friendly Framework' which is fundamental for enabling a safe space to engage with Guiding, and we are leading changes in historical partnership practices at national and state level with Scouts and other partners.

There has been solid progress implementing the inaugural GGQ Equity Statement through the Reshaping Revenue Project. The review and resulting changes are scheduled for completion by 2026.

With 76% of Youth Members aged under 13, we continue to be largest girl voice charity in Queensland. Now with youth waiting lists in many units, we have focused on reshaping the Guiding experience for adults as a precursor for effective recruitment campaigns. In so doing, we value our legacy whilst moving at a pace that does not overwhelm and provides time for infrastructure and supports to be in place.

I am delighted to see growth in the younger demographics of Adult Leaders which reflects the emphasis of our changing practices that are realistic to how women want to volunteer. I am equally proud that mature members remain active and pass on their joy of the Guiding Spirit. This is particularly important for those new to the Guiding journey as we welcome a more diverse membership which is reflective of our society.

The budget allocated to staffing is enhancing member value and the quality of the Guiding experience, whilst reducing pressure on members, staff and key areas of organisational risk.

I am heartened by our transition as the Reshaping Revenue project deepens our shared understanding of, and focuses on, flexible approaches and systems for Guiding. We are adaptative and kind with our precious assets which is reflected in our generous Districts donating funds to State Office to redistribute based on need.

I commend to you highlights of our performance (pages 10-13) and the Social Impact Survey (page 16).

It is with gratitude I acknowledge our partners, grant bodies, individuals, and Play 4 Purpose raffle ticket optimists! Each contribution is making a difference for girls, women and the communities in which we serve, live, recreate and work.

2024 heralds an exciting time as we are well positioned as a 104-year strong organisation, to continue our evolution in line with the 2022-2026 Strategic Plan.

REPORT FROM OUR CHAIR OF FINANCE AND RISK

2023 was another productive year for GGQ, gaining further momentum on our strategic plan objectives, focusing on revenue generation and risk management through improving processes to ensure a safe, connected and accessible organisation for all.

We commend the CEO for exceeding the approved budget for 2023 and the collaborative leadership with the State Commissioner and Members to negotiate the many changes underway to deliver on the 2022-2026 Strategic Plan.

Membership income increased slightly due to the small increase in fees introduced in 2023. Membership numbers dipped as projected however long-term member attraction and retention strategies are expected to begin to be realised in 2024/25 and the Social impact of Guiding in Queensland is a testament to all.

Staff, supported by Members, had great success in obtaining grants in 2023. A key action from the CEO Reshaping Revenue project focused on recalibrating the approach for grant applications and acquittals which has seen an increase in support for program events, learning and volunteer support.

In Q2 2023, we received an Active Clubs Round 3 Grant for \$327,500 from the Department of Tourism and Sport Queensland. This supports the education and training of volunteers and to invest in equipment and facilities to provide increased physical activity opportunities.

Funds have been directed towards volunteer resourcing which is critical to the delivery of our program including: First aid and uniforms

for Leaders; District Managers Conference; Gift vouchers for Districts for use on supplies and transportation; Board leadership training; State Dinner; National Police Checks and Marketing collateral. The balance of funds, \$228k will be expended in 2024 and is captured on our balance sheet.

In May, we received a \$1 million commitment from the Queensland State Government, managed by the Department of Tourism and Sport, to support our properties and spaces to continue to enable quality, accessible, safe and efficient activity. The funds are prioritised as per the delegation authorities set by the Board, in line with the Property Asset Management Strategy via recommendations from the CEO appointed Steering Committee and FAR Committee. This critical injection of funds will provide funds to continue the enormous work required to effectively manage property assets and ensure safety and access for all. We received \$500k with the remainder of funds received and acquitted by June 2025.

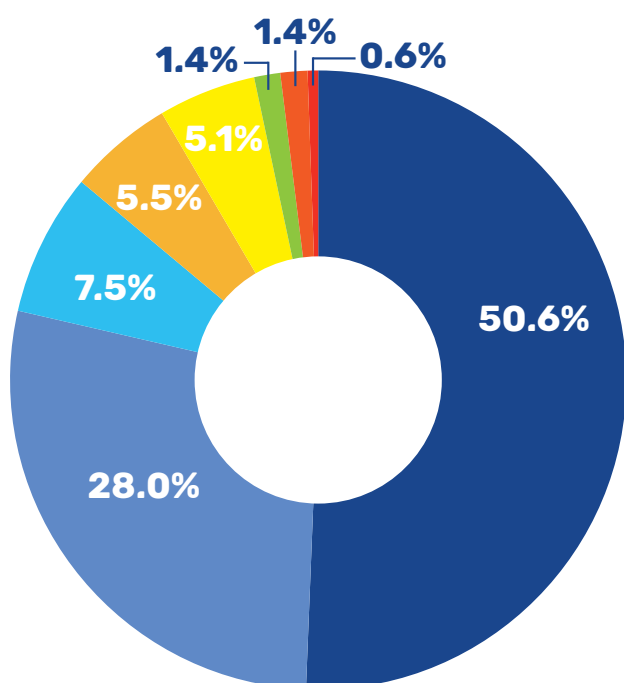
PGL Adventure Camps management of Kindilan is driving strong revenue. There have been solid results from smaller scale events providing meaningful, memorable, and well organised occasions for girls and women across the State.

Our investments saw an increase in valuation of \$106,503 in 2023, with these financial gains contributing to our sustainability.

In 2023, we saw a reduction in our depreciation expenditure as we have reclassified assets on the balance sheet over the last three years. There was a necessary increase in professional fees as we continue to deliver the digital transformation strategy. Management has worked hard to reduce expenditure in a considered manner. On behalf of the Board, I acknowledge the work of the FAR Committee and the strong collaboration between Members and staff as changes are discussed, risks are identified and mitigated, and new ways of work are implemented which benefit all.

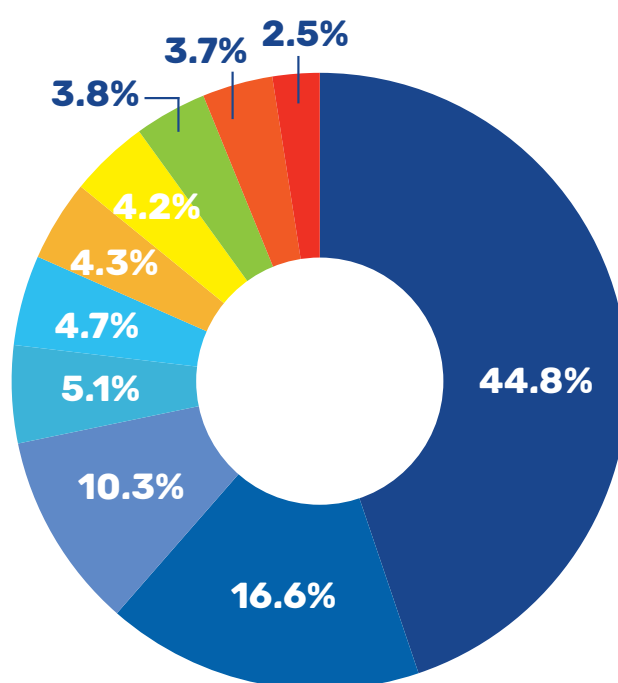

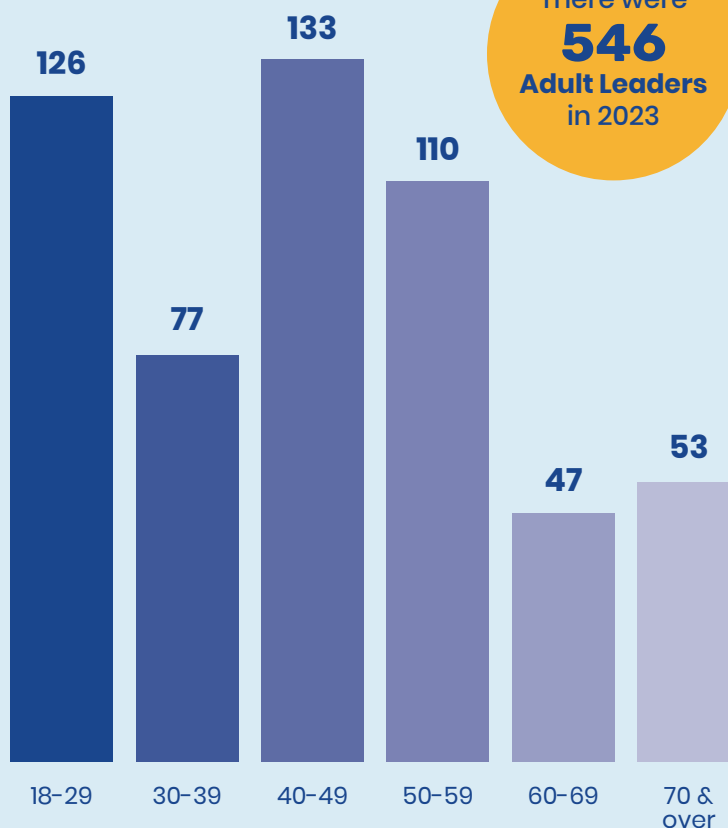

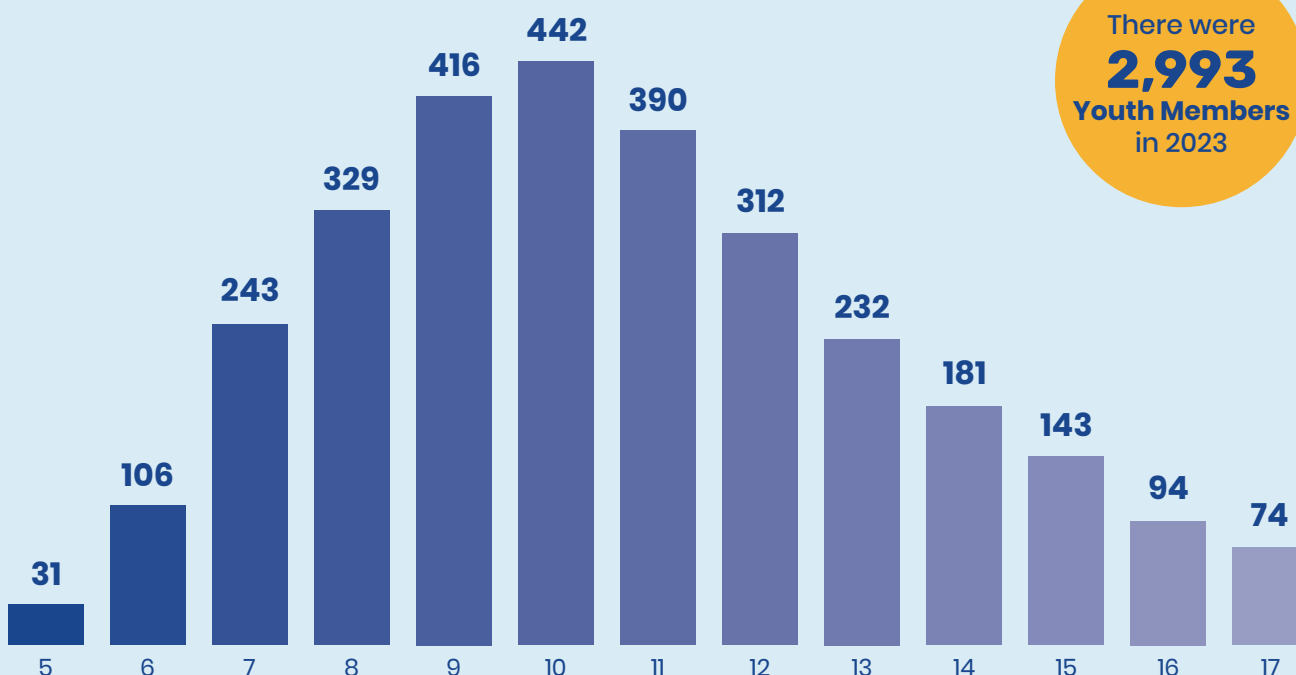

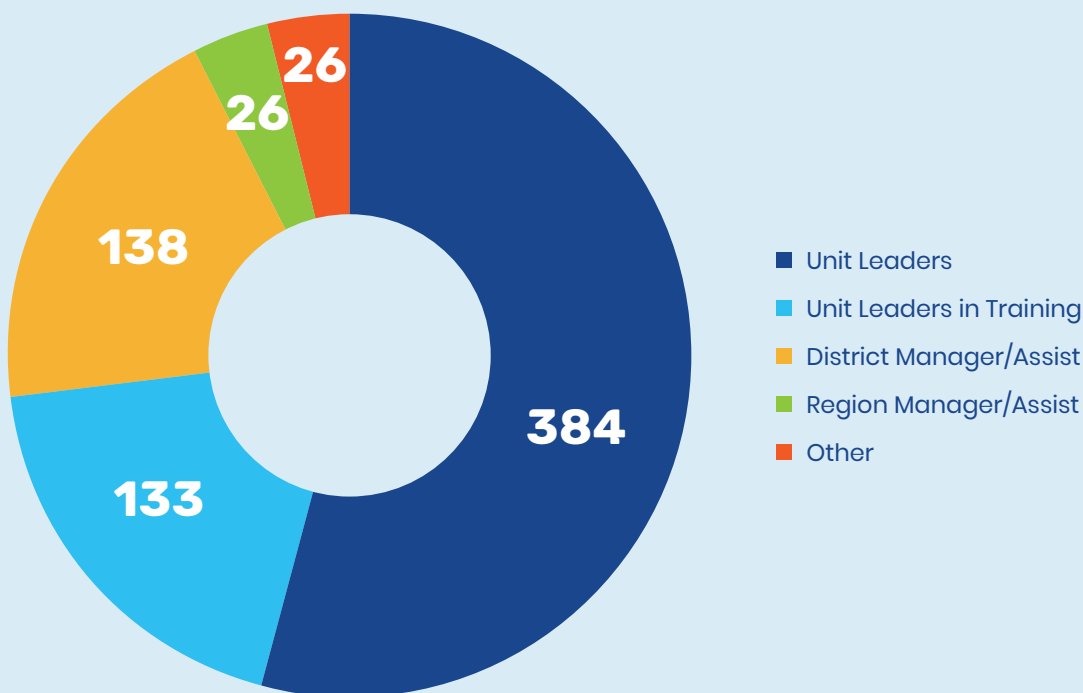

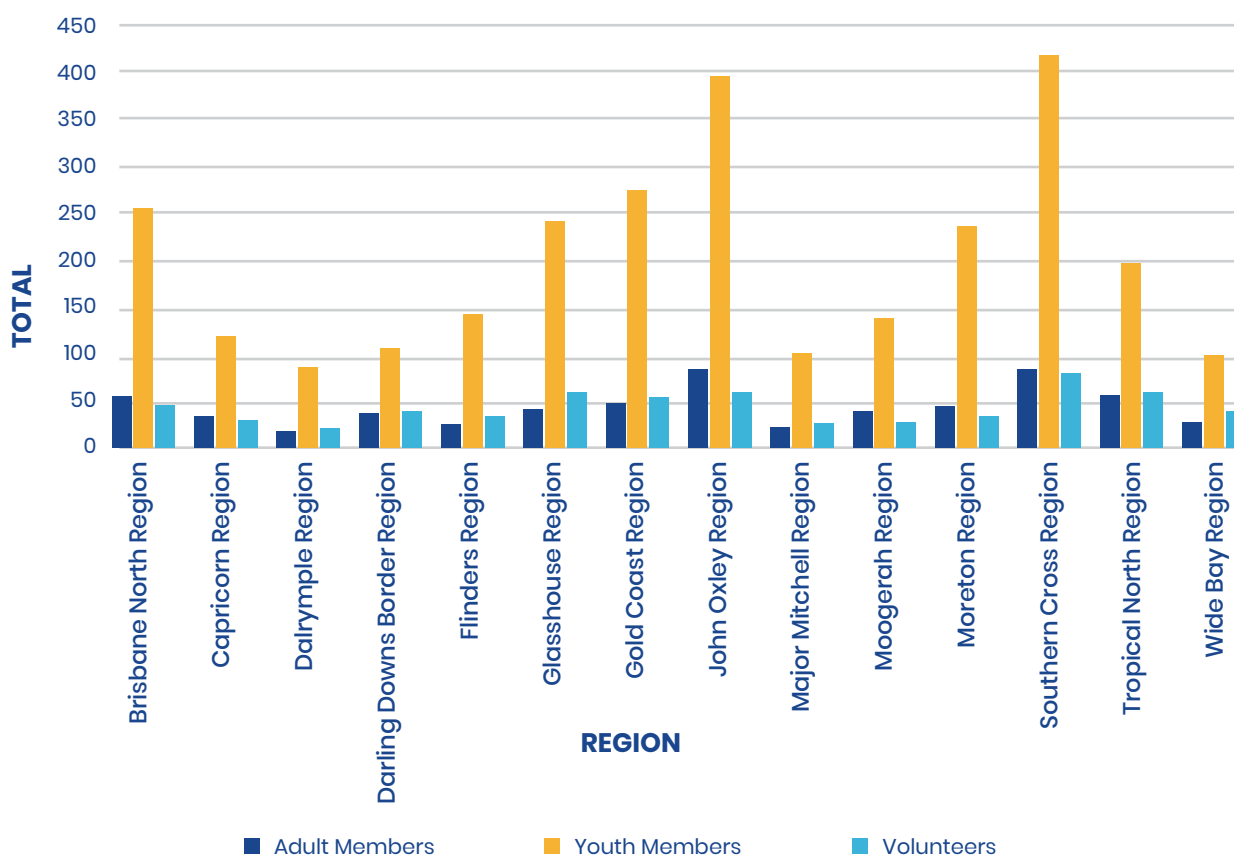

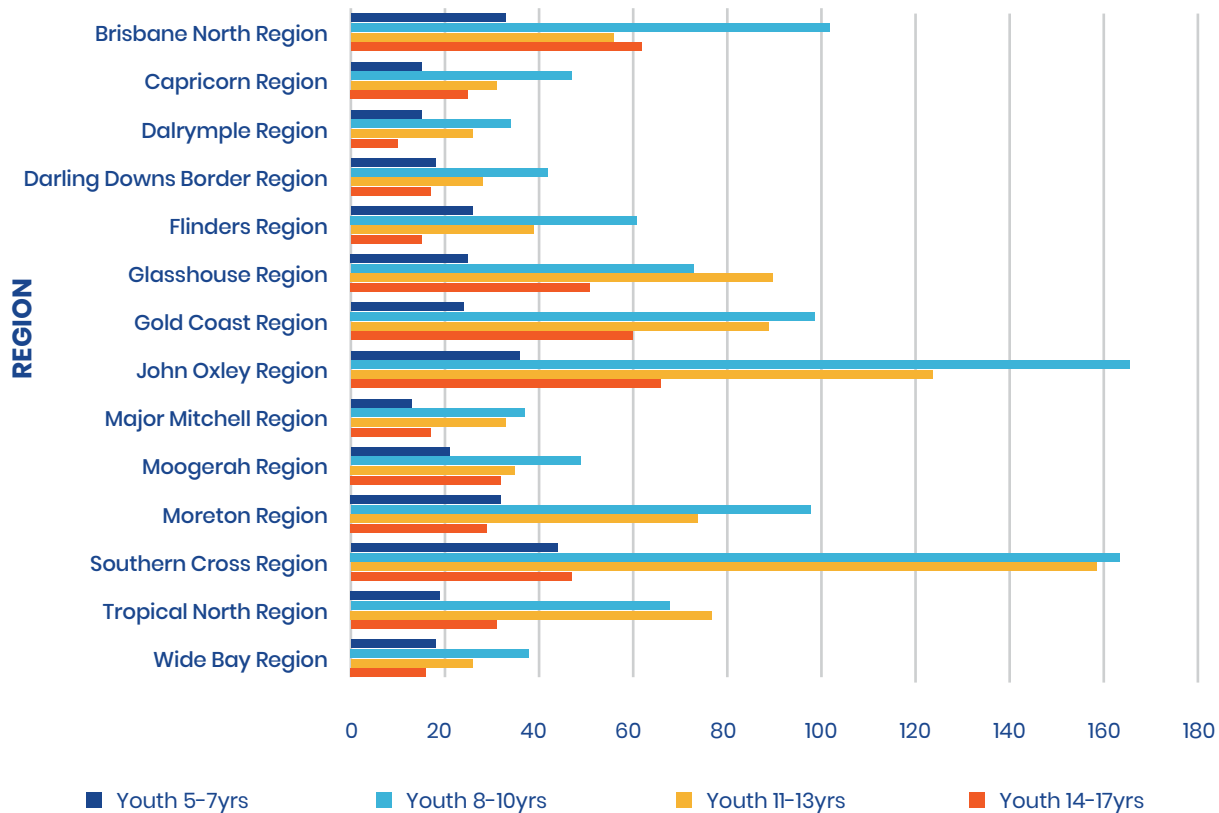
LEADERSHIP POSITIONS (INC MULTIPLE ROLES)

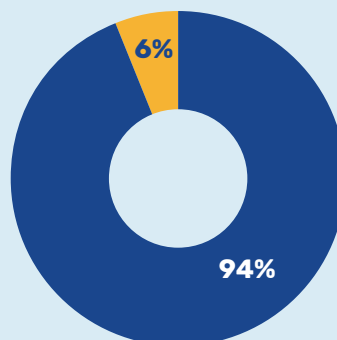

GIRL GUIDES QUEENSLAND SOCIAL IMPACT REPORT 2023

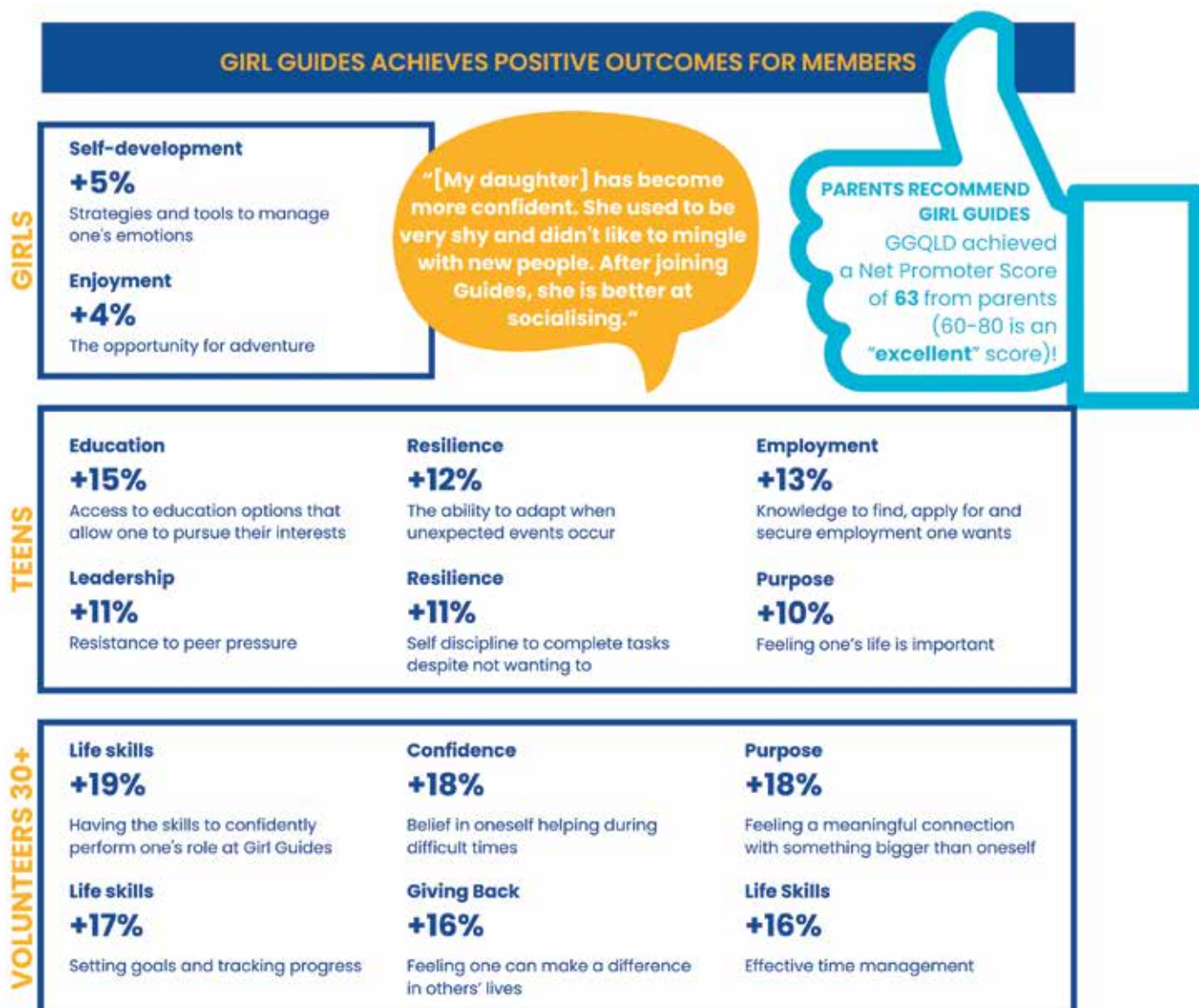
Since 2021, Girl Guides Queensland has been measuring our social impact alongside other Girl Guides state organisations. In 2023, GGQ dove more deeply into our specific cohort of Guides, with the following findings based entirely on Queensland Guides and incorporating data from all three years of measurement.

Data collection and analysis has been conducted across four measurement groups:

- Young Girls aged 8-12 years
- Teens aged 13-17 years
- Volunteers aged 18-30 years
- Volunteers over the age of 30

These findings provide insights not only into the existing impact of GGQ, but also how we can best adapt and change to more effectively support the holistic wellbeing of Guides.

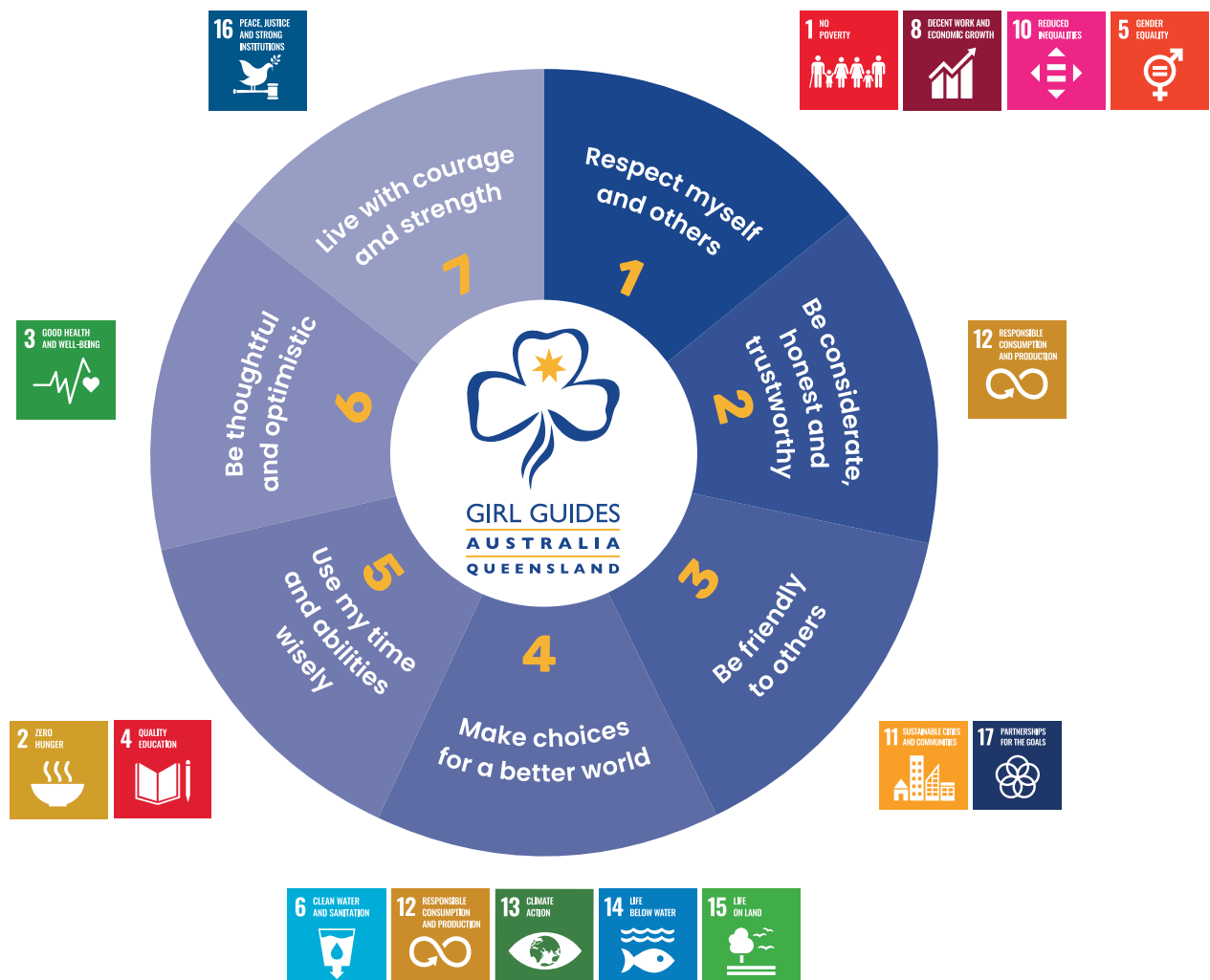
GIRL GUIDES QUEENSLAND AND THE UNITED NATIONS SUSTAINABLE DEVELOPMENT GOALS (SDGs)

GGQ is committed to tackling issues identified by the United Nation's Sustainable Development Goals. From body confidence and well-being to environmental sustainability and access to a healthy, nutritious diet – we inspire, educate and empower girls and women to make a positive difference.

Aligned to the World Association of Girl Guides and Girl Scouts (WAGGGS), our program follows the methodology of – Learn, Lead,

Speak Out and Volunteer – which enables girls to better understand their rights and gives them a voice and platform to change attitudes in wider society.

As a small organisation with charity and DGR status, we are succeeding in implementing agile business systems and practices across a predominantly volunteer workforce, whilst managing changing regulatory environments and a raft of industry standards.



1. RESPECT MYSELF AND OTHERS (SDGS 1, 5, 8, 10)

- We support programs aimed at women and children living below the poverty line by donating to Share the Dignity, local homeless and women's shelters. GGQ has also developed an Equity Statement to be embedded throughout all aspects of our systems and service delivery by 2026.
- We actively aim to empower girls and young women to be leaders in their world through our Australian Guiding Program by:
 - Offering a remote and flexible workplace for employees with learning and upskilling opportunities through intern and employment programs.
 - Supporting local business and community organisations for improved economic development.
 - Supporting those less fortunate. We aim to empower and promote social and economic inclusion, to build awareness of challenges and offer support to those who require it through active participation in local, national and international events.

2. BE CONSIDERATE, HONEST AND TRUSTWORTHY (SDG 12)

- Wherever possible, GGQ implements sustainable practices across its Guiding operations. There are still challenges to address around the sustainable consumption of materials and further work is required in this area.
- Our work in this area is underpinned by pillars one and two in our strategic plan – Delivering the Australian Guide Program and Supporting Members and Volunteers.

3. BE FRIENDLY TO OTHERS (SDGS 11, 17)

- GGQ received grant funding in 2022 to support resilience in our communities and this program was rolled out in 2023. Additional work on inclusive, safe and sustainable communities will flow out of the Property Asset Management Strategy.
- GGQ is committed to playing its role in strengthening the outcomes of the SDG goals, taking direct action that will positively contribute to its success and remaining transparent regarding where additional action can be taken.

4. MAKE CHOICES FOR A BETTER WORLD (SDGS 6, 12, 13, 14, 15)

- GGQ has access to clean water and sanitation – subject to natural disasters which impact our members and communities annually. During this time, we partner with SES and other community agencies to deliver emergency support.
- To futureproof our property portfolio the Property Asset Management Strategy will explore opportunities for ongoing access to modern, reliable energy.
- WAGGGS is introducing program materials which can be accessed by all Guide units. GGQ will monitor the uptake of such programs. In addition, service programs such as habitat restoration programs and containers for change collection directly contribute to climate action.
- With Guides located near the Great Barrier Reef, it's important that we support programs aimed at its conservation. Our future program and approach will directly address this goal.
- We continue to contribute to these goals through activities including creek restoration and habitat rehabilitation.

5. USE MY TIME AND ABILITIES WISELY (SDGS 2, 4)

- Many GGQ districts all are involved locally with community groups that offer meal support and care. Additionally, we regularly donate our time to volunteering activities that raise funding for local food-based charities.
- Our Guides participate in cooking programs to build skills and understanding of nutrition.
- We encourage all youth and adults to upskill and develop their education. Our strategic plan seeks to build the volunteer experience with training in specific skills.
- In 2023 we offered training and skills development opportunities in areas including youth and adult leadership, outdoors skills and disaster resilience. Our non-formal education program supports girls with learning and augments formalised approaches to the development of numeracy and literacy development.

6. BE THOUGHTFUL AND OPTIMISTIC (SDG 3)

- Our active outdoor lifestyle promotes good health and wellbeing for all.
- Service activities include Zonta Birthing Kits.

7. LIVE WITH COURAGE AND STRENGTH (SDG 16)

- Through the Australian Guiding Program, Guides are encouraged to build positive relationships, be friends to others and live with courage and strength. Through World Guiding activities members are exposed to some of the challenges that are faced by our Guiding sisters.

GGQ plays a vital and multifaceted role in our community, fostering growth, empowerment, and positive change. We contribute to a stronger, more compassionate community by nurturing confident, capable, and caring individuals. February 15, 2023

A first-aid training session at the Bundaberg Girl Guides came at the right time for 14-year-old Lara when she was required to put her newly acquired knowledge into action only a month later.

QAS Miriam Vale Officer in Charge Maree, who is also the Region Manager for the Girl Guides, conducted the first-aid training and was proud as punch to hear how Lara retained crucial learnings and demonstrated them in a high stress environment.

Lara was with her mum Jodie at the hairdressers, when Jodie suddenly collapsed and began having a seizure. Jodie said even in a room full of adults, Lara stayed calm and controlled the situation.

"She checked for my breathing, moved things out of the way, and shoved my bag under my head. When I stopped seizing, she directed an adult to help her and she put me in the recovery position keep my head down in case I vomited," Jodie said.

Lara reflected that previously she wasn't sure how she'd react in one of those situations but was proud that she knew what to do when the time came.

In recognition of her composed actions despite the highly stressful scene, Maree caught up with Lara and Jodie this week and presented her with a number of first-aid related Girl Guide patches.

Lara's story highlights that at any age, having the skills to react in an un-expected emergency can go a long way to keeping your loved ones safe. Don't delay if you need to brush up on your first aid and CPR skills!

Bethany and Abigail Hull have been Guides for 7 years at our Ormeau district on the Gold Coast. When they first joined in 2017, both girls were shy and through Guiding they have built confidence and maturity, leading them to participate in many events and activities, including countless hours volunteering in their local community.

While making sure they attend the camps and activities on offer in their local district, the girls have also travelled extensively in Australia and overseas meeting up with Guide units in Paris and Edinburgh and attending

the Essex International Jamboree in July. They have also been lucky enough to spend time in one of our WAGGSS World Centres – Our Chalet – in the Swiss Alps, for a week!

Their learnings from meeting with international Guides has served them well in their understanding of the importance of Guiding in our communities – here and afar.

When the girls aren't attending Guide events, they spend many hours volunteering in their local community, including tree planting, meals on wheels and supporting other charity groups.

Gordonvale District includes plenty of opportunities for community service for Guides. From Clean Up Australia Day to supporting Lions events, our Guides are regularly seen out and active in the community.

Ranger-aged Guides decorate the Gordonvale Hospital wards annually and participate in the Anzac Day service and event parades, such as the Sugar Solace. Older Guides regularly collect and make up toiletry packs for the local women’s centre and collect food and bedding items for needy animals via the RSPCA, Yaps and Pet Rescue.

A favourite time for our Guides is when they participate in the Kmart wishing tree appeal and face painting at the Cairns Special Kids Christmas Party.

Marlin Coast District has been a regular participant in community events for many years and always endeavours to maintain a good connection with local groups and visiting organisations.

For this District, an action-packed schedule includes supporting the Cairns 7 Marathon and Cairns Ironman events, proudly volunteering for the local community, interstate and local athletes, not to mention event organisers.

Guides supported a new local event called Crankworx, the world's largest mountain bike festival, providing an opportunity to participate in a family-friendly, world-class event.

We also partner with Bunnings Smithfield's "family activity nights" during Easter, Christmas, Mother's and Father's Days and support Mossman RSL by selling ANZAC Day and Remembrance Day merchandise on their behalf.

Atherton District had a busy year serving the local community. Guides provided a quality catering service at the quarterly Arts and Crafts Fair, the yearly Book Fair in Yungaburra, and the Tradies Golf Day at Atherton Golf Club. The girls learned essential skills, including hygienic food service, handling, preparation and managing finances.

We participate in Clean Up Australia by cleaning up the area around our hut and a nearby park. Towards the end of the year, Guides collected food items to be distributed by the local Meals on Wheels.

Adult members of GGQ consistently experience higher levels of wellbeing, surpassing those of women in the general population by an impressive 3%. Guiding not only contributes to enhanced confidence and a stronger sense of purpose but also facilitates the development of valuable life skills.

When expressing their appreciation for Guides (see Social Impact Survey 2023 on page 16), members highlighted the following three aspects:

STATE EMERGENCY SERVICE (SES)

We continued to work in proud partnership with the SES in 2024, providing us with the opportunity to support and honour the hard work and dedication that the SES provides to the communities of Queensland.

GGQ is committed to working collaboratively with the SES to deliver the SES Badge Program. This program offers Guides the opportunity to expand their understanding of the role of the SES, learn new skills and face challenges, encourage discussion and advocacy for gender equality in organisations and learn about volunteering opportunities the SES offers to young women in Queensland.



OUTDOORS QUEENSLAND

Funded by the Active Industry Fund administered by Department of Tourism, Innovation and Sport, Outdoors Queensland produced the inaugural Outdoors Census Report. This report demonstrates the size and diversity of the sector – identifying that a vast range of outdoor organisations, like GGQ, provide services to almost 1 million participants in an average month.

Our CEO joined the Outdoors Queensland Census Reference Group from April to July. Working with the Executive Officer, Board Director, Queensland Tourism Industry Council and Department of Sport and Recreation and facilitator Way To Be, where insights were shared to guide the scope, design and engagement of this inaugural project.

GGQ has a long history of facilitating and delivering outdoor activities, programs and experiences. We look forward to continuing to offer insight into the important role that charities with large volunteer workforces contribute to achieving national and state policy outcomes.



BUNNINGS

Thanks to the continued national partnership with Bunnings, Units have raised vital funds through Bunnings sausage sizzles. Bunnings joined the Share the Dignity "It's in the bag" campaign by being a nominated drop off point for community collections. This campaign was a national GGIA project with a target of donating 600 bags of essential goods.

Coordinated by Olaves, GGQ donated a total of 163 bags of essential personal health items: 101 adult bags, 50 teen bags and 12 mum and baby bags. This was a fantastic effort where we contributed an impressive 32% towards GGIA's national donation goal.

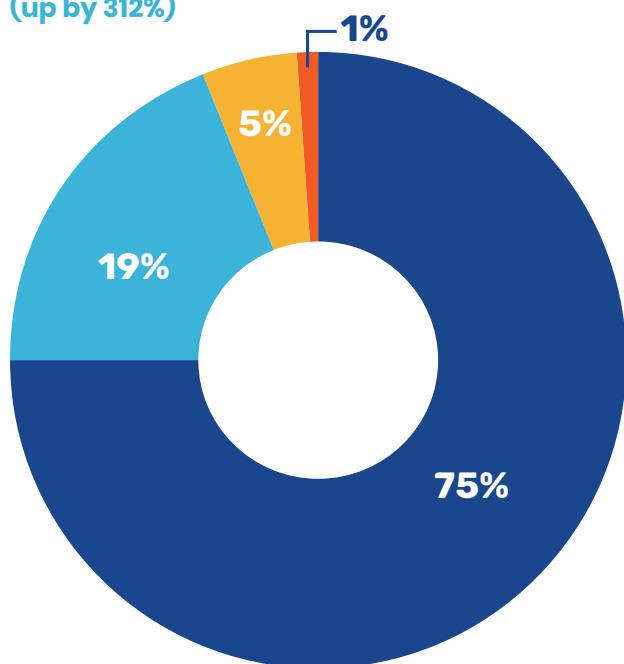

OUR GUIDE PROPERTIES

GGQ manages a portfolio of 139 properties and supports the maintenance of facilities for many of its 331 guiding units. The properties are used regularly by Guides for important ceremonial gatherings, camps and activities.

We continued reviewing the utilisation of our properties in line with the Property Asset Management Plan. This involved collaboration with Members, volunteers in Support Groups, District and Region Managers and the State Commissioners Team, resulting in a prudent reduction of the portfolio from 147 to 139 properties.

Some properties offer a secure space for local community groups and provide a small income to offset the costs of operation. Our campsites provide a space for local communities and Members to spend quality time in the great outdoors.

We thank our dedicated District and Regional Managers, Campsite Committees, Leaders and volunteers, and their families, who dedicate their time, resources and efforts to provide a safe and positive experience for our Guiding community.

\$1 MILLION COMMITMENT FROM QUEENSLAND GOVERNMENT

In May 2023, the Queensland Government announced the allocation of \$1 million to GGQ in the 2023/24 state budget for facility improvements under the Priority Infrastructure Project Grant (PIP). Managed by the Department of Tourism and Sport (DTS), it's funds support a state-wide audit of facilities to inform refurbishment and upgrades to enhance community sport and active recreation participation through the provision of spaces that enable quality, accessible, inclusive, safe and more efficient activity.

Audit results are expected in March 2024 and projects will be determined in line with the GGQ Strategic Plan 2022-2026 and the Property Asset Management Strategy. The opportunity to leverage funds with other grant opportunities is underway to increase the benefits and span of the funds.

We acknowledge the funds received from Federal, State and Local Government and private bodies which is vital to maintenance works. The fundraising skills of our tireless Members, Support Groups and staff is admirable. However, increases in insurance due to weather impacts, energy, labour, and supply costs are driving the imperative for higher investment in property expertise to support the long-term sustainability of Guiding.

In 2023, five districts answered the call to trial new technology to assist with letting. Space to Co is an online booking system to automate the booking of each Hut to our hirers and we are already seeing great results with increases in utilisation and income.

PROPERTY UPDATES

ALGESTER HUT – FUNDED BY BRISBANE CITY COUNCIL

Hut renovations have been completed with a new kitchen and installation of CrimSafe security screens and doors, funded through the Stronger Communities Program.

COOMERA HUT - FUNDED BY CITY OF GOLD COAST

New leased facility – new kitchen, open plan arrangement and facilities.

GUIDE HOUSE MARSDEN – UPDATE

Despite a generous donation of demountable buildings by the Gilchrist Family Trust and the Community Gambling Benefit Fund in 2022, works have been delayed due to a series of compliance requirements of local government and regulatory requirements. The project is under negotiation.

SOUTHPORT HUT – INSURANCE REPAIR

Flood damage repair was required for the hut after a burst water main. This provided an opportunity to rearrange storage layout. Well done to District Managers and volunteers who removed trees from the site.

VICTORIA POINT HUT – FUNDED BY REDLAND CITY COUNCIL

The repair of decking on the access ramp to the Hut and replacing the roof and guttering on the storage shed was funded by Redland City Council and is now complete.



KINDILAN – REPORT FROM PGL ADVENTURE CAMPS

We had a busy start to the year with the first groups arriving from in early January. There was an increase in school bookings this year with many returning after the pandemic and other new schools joining us for the first time at Kindilan.



Weekend groups visits were down on last year, but school holidays throughout the year were all busy with church, family, sporting and charity groups attending.

In 2023, we saw the return of the KoroBoro International School from Papua New Guinea with 120 students aged 13 years old staying with us. This was the first time since 2019 that the school has travelled, and for most of the students, it was their first time on a plane and being away from their home.

In total, the camp had 21,016 bed nights for the year with GGQ contributing 1,400 bed nights (6.6%) of this total. Activities included Low Ropes and Canoeing sessions on the dedicated Girl Guide weekends in addition to a successful Arts Camp held in late May.

Our maintenance program continued this year with the ongoing goal of improving the buildings and grounds. One major project was the building of a second Flying Fox next to the existing activity base.

Some other areas of works include:

- Upgrade to the toilets in Brownie Cottage
- Upgrade to Tilly shelter toilet block
- Gutters replaced on both Round Houses
- Kitchen upgrade in Ngulu and Kintarli
- Both Round Houses had curtains replaced
- Upgrade to the plumbing system under the hall
- Upgrade to the activity equipment

2024 will be another busy year and the PGL team are looking forward to the continued growth of Kindilan and working closely with the CEO and her team to support increased utilisation of this wonderful property.

ARCHIVES

For over 100 years, the GGQ Archives has been an important part of maintaining the history of Guides and our legacy in Queensland. The archive includes the story of our members, their service, historical photos and memorabilia.

We celebrated a number of significant anniversaries (page 33) which are moments in time to celebrate the contributions made over the years by hundreds of girls and women.

We acknowledge the immense contribution of Jill Hogrefe, Archivist. For many years, Jill has been the guardian, retaining an accurate and preserved account of GGQ. This contribution is felt in Queensland, Australia and internationally.

A review of the sustainability of this critical work is underway and will be reflected in 2024 actions.

HERITAGE IN ACTION —TARRAGINDI HUT FINDS A PERMANENT HOME

In July 2023, Brisbane City Council asked if GGQ would like to relocate the Tarragindi Girl Guide Hut while the existing site was redeveloped. This relocation was important to maintain the Hut's history as the first Guide Hut in Queensland, officially named the Marjorie Grimes Memorial Hut in November 1956, after the founder of Guides in Queensland, Marjorie Grimes.

The Hut was successfully relocated from Tarragindi to Kindilan and will undergo updates in 2024/25 (pending funding) for use as a public display of GGQ history for visitors. This initiative would not have been possible without \$25,000 of funding from Brisbane City Council for relocation and permit costs, and the co-operation and expertise of the PGL team coordinating its safe delivery.



DELOITTE NATIONAL IMPACT DAY— CARING FOR KINDILAN

In October, staff from Deloitte's Brisbane office, joined Simon Pucko General Manager, PGL Kindilan, Kathryn Pearson, State Commissioner and Donna Thompson, in a day of reshaping Kumanka Trail, a historic guide track in need of some extra love.
